



Fit for Duty

Each year, we extend an invitation to all members of the agency to participate in a physical fitness test, as a means by which to encourage an active and healthy life style. Participants are tested in five events and are required to obtain a passing score based on the exit standards set for police recruits graduating from the Department of Criminal Justice Training – Basic Police Academy. The events are comprised of: bench press; sit-ups; 300-meter sprint; pushups; and the 1.5 mile run.

Core Values In Action

Leadership

In an effort to address the challenge posed by round-the-clock work schedules, and enhance information dissemination and reinforce a sense of unity among our personnel, the CCPD has introduced a monthly newsletter titled "The Buzz." The name is derived from the agency's historical police shoulder patch, featuring a beehive. The primary objective of "The Buzz" is to serve as a platform for employees to share stories, exchange information, and foster stronger connections across all shifts. By highlighting the achievements and contributions of our team members, we aim to create a valuable resource that strengthens the bonds among our personnel, fostering a sense of camaraderie for years to come.

Community

In 2023, the CCPD expanded its School Resource Program through a collaborative initiative with the Campbell County School District. Through this partnership we were able to increase the number of School Resource Officer (SRO) positions within the agency. Consequently, each of the Cline and Crossroads Elementary schools was assigned a dedicated SRO, further fortifying the department's commitment to enhancing community safety and fostering a secure educational environment.

Service

Several noteworthy initiatives were undertaken this year, including the expansion of our drone capability through the acquisition of a drone equipped with thermal imaging technology. The benefits of this drone became evident as it was pivotal to our ability to locate missing children within wooded areas during nighttime operations on two separate occasions. Furthermore, in response to an observed increase in traffic collisions along the primary arteries of our county, namely U.S. 27 and AA Highway, we implemented a targeted traffic enforcement initiative with the dedication of units during every shift over an extended duration. The success achieved through this proactive approach has prompted the CCPD to consider the continuation of a modified program in the foreseeable future.

Efficiency

The CCPD consistently monitors advancements in technology with the objective of improving our capabilities and overall performance. Among the technologies we have fully embraced is the integration of optic sights for our firearms. We began with an initial pilot program, designed to assess the suitability of this technology for our agency. The results indicated not only an enhancement in our officers' abilities, but also the potential to elevate officer safety. Regrettably, our existing patrol rifles, aged over two decades, were not designed to accommodate modern optics, necessitating their replacement. We are pleased to announce that, through a grant awarded by the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security, we successfully acquired new patrol rifles specifically designed for optic utilization.
